

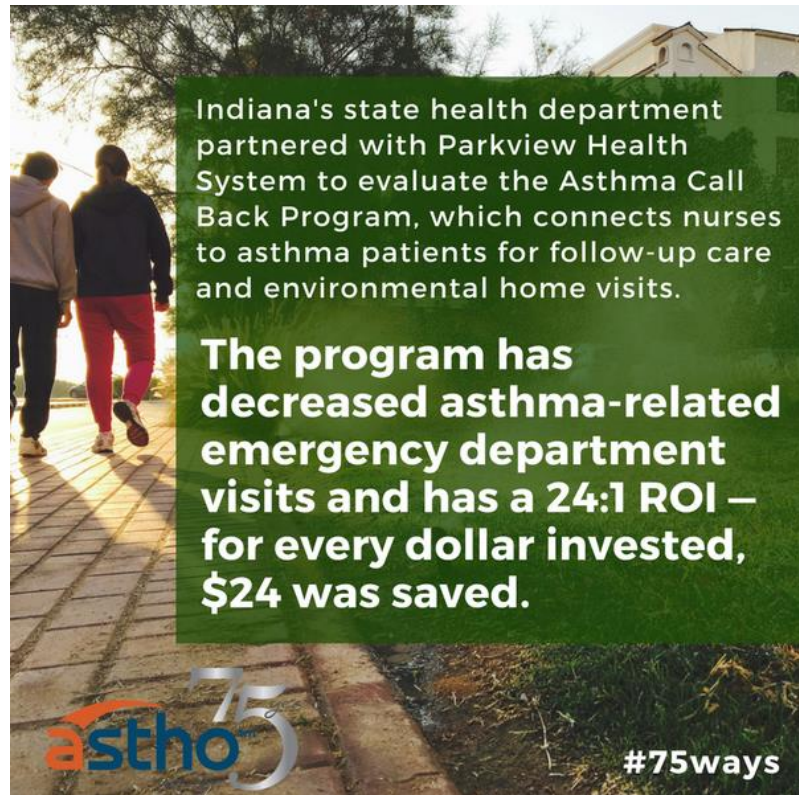

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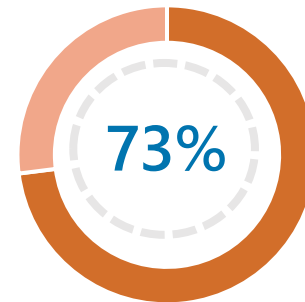

IMPACT OF POTENTIAL CUTS TO FEDERAL FUNDING



Cut or eliminate public health programs that help individuals stay healthy and prevent disease, leading to lost productivity due to illness and increased health care costs when they get sick



Increased rates of infectious disease due to limited capacity to protect people from infection and respond to communicable disease outbreaks



Reduce or eliminate the capacity to analyze public health data. The loss of this capacity limits the ability to make informed decisions about disease prevention and health planning.



Fewer opportunities to conduct public health emergency exercises, reducing the ability to respond to a variety of hazards



Less funding to provide local health departments to implement programs, potentially increasing the disease burden on the state's most vulnerable

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CDC 2018 OPIOID OVERDOSE CRISIS FUNDING

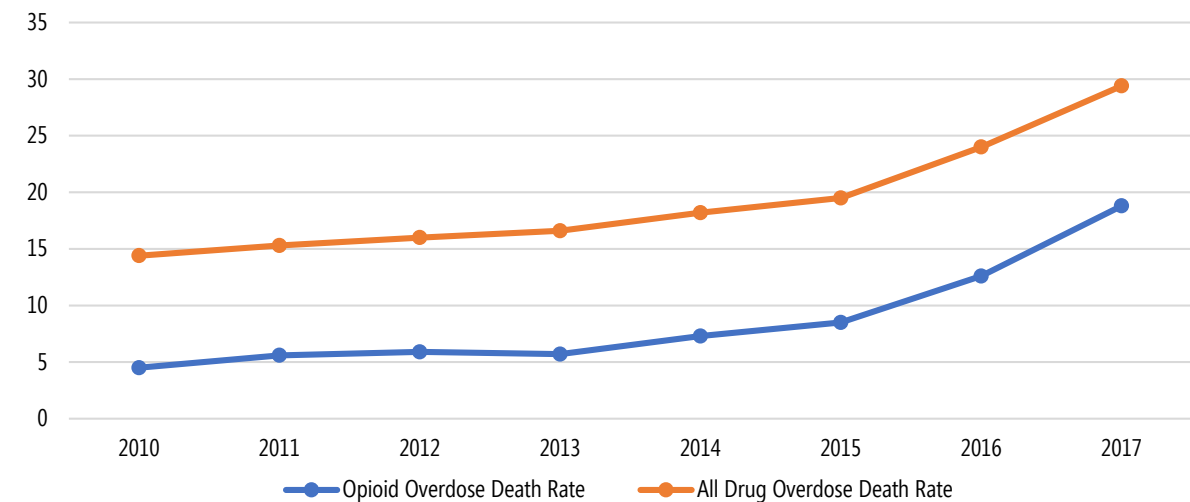
Year 1 (FY18) \$7,470,631

This funding will support Indiana in working to prevent opioid-related overdoses, deaths, and other outcomes. It will advance the understanding of the epidemic and scale-up prevention and response activities, including improving the timeliness of data. Specifically:

- Opioid overdose data collection programs
- Coroner toxicology program and training
- Expanded opioid education and community outreach
- Enhanced laboratory capacity to analyze substances
