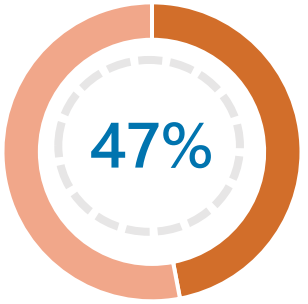
State health agencies are working across the country to actively protect the public's health, prevent avoidable diseases and conditions, and promote healthy communities.

Public health and healthcare partners are developing new approaches to deliver and pay for STD services:

Mississippi worked with the state Medicaid agency to assess the impact of fee-for-service vs. encounter-based billing at a major STD clinic.

By creating a revenue-based decision model, Mississippi found that improved encounter-based billing could generate \$85,000 in additional revenue.

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CDC 2018 OPIOID OVERDOSE CRISIS FUNDING

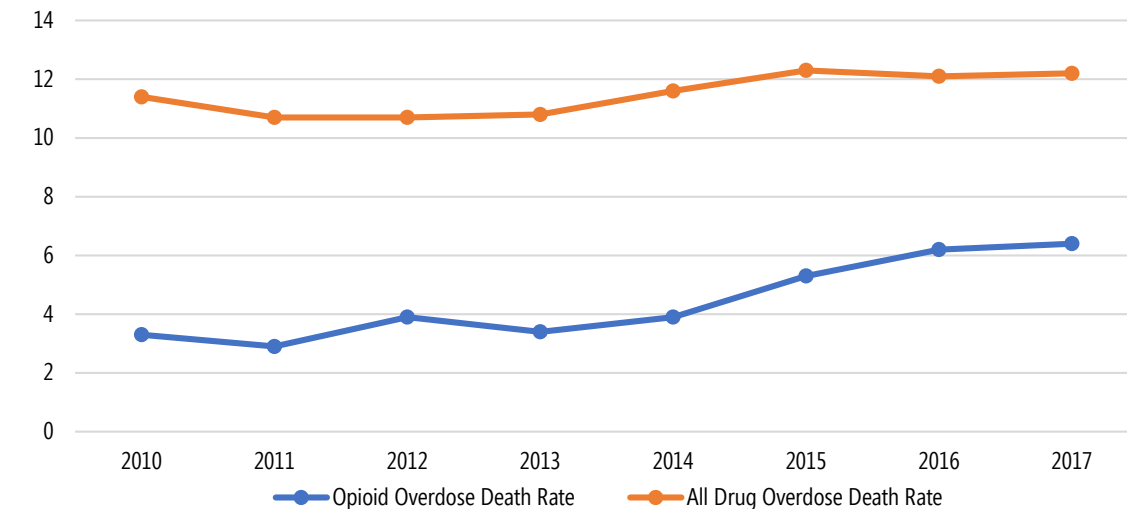
Year 1 (FY18) \$1,500,000.00

This funding will support Mississippi in working to prevent opioid-related overdoses, deaths, and other outcomes. It will advance the understanding of the epidemic and scale-up prevention and response activities, including improving the timeliness of data. Specifically:

1. Strengthening BioSense to improve surveillance capacity and adding hospitals in high risk areas.
2. Improving access to the state's Prescription Monitoring Program through the state's Health Information Exchange.
3. Establishing HIPAA-compliant notification processes through the HIE to support the Department of Mental Health and Child Protective Services.
4. Assessing feasibility syringe services programs.
5. Enhanced provider training on opioid prescribing, addiction and MAT.
