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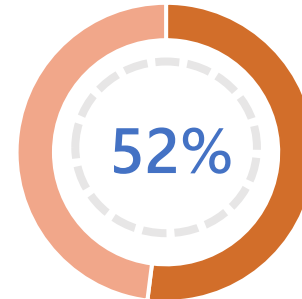

IMPACT OF POTENTIAL CUTS TO FEDERAL FUNDING

-  Increased rates of infectious disease due to limited capacity to protect people from infection and respond to communicable disease outbreaks
-  Reduced ability to respond to environmental health threats putting communities at risk for health hazards
-  Delay disease outbreak response and investigation activities resulting in increased illness and death
-  Reduce or eliminate the capacity to analyze public health data. The loss of this capacity limits the ability to make informed decisions about disease prevention and health planning.

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CDC 2018 OPIOID OVERDOSE CRISIS FUNDING

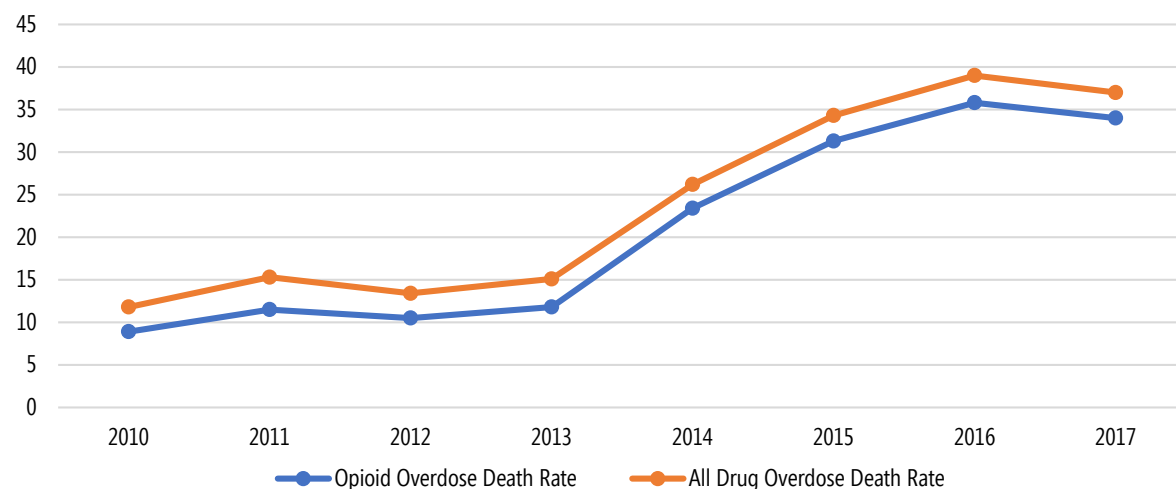
Year 1 (FY18) \$3,935,954

This funding will support New Hampshire in working to prevent opioid-related overdoses, deaths, and other outcomes. It will advance the understanding of the epidemic and scale-up prevention and response activities, including improving the timeliness of data. Specifically:

- HIV/Hepatitis C Jail Testing Initiative
- Enhancing DHHS dash boarding capability
- Enhancement of Prescription Data Monitoring Programs for opioid-related data and surveillance and staffing for program data audit.
- Training programs across systems including drug courts
- Community harm reduction initiatives
