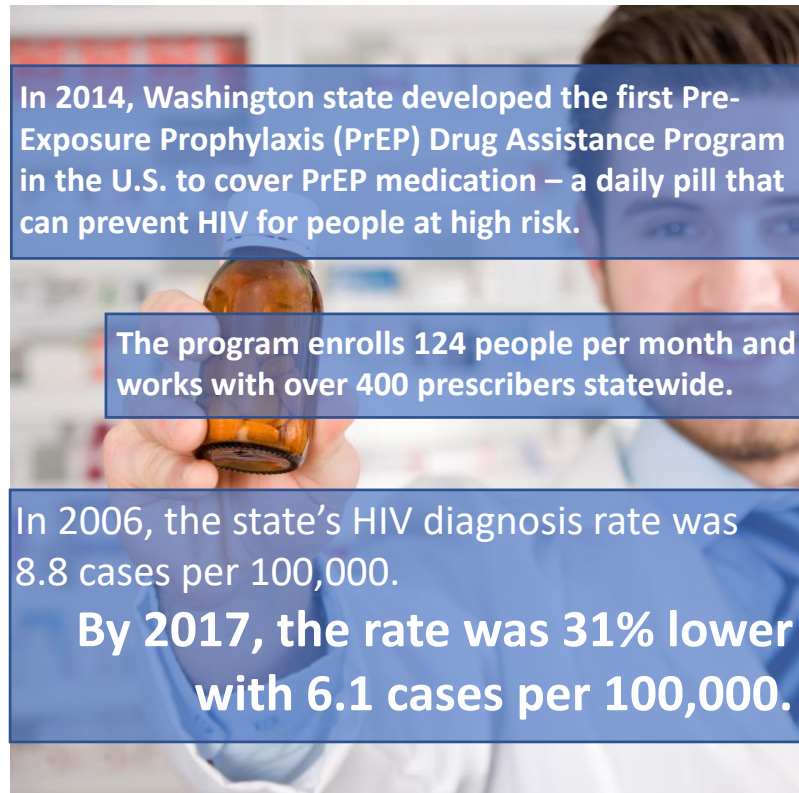


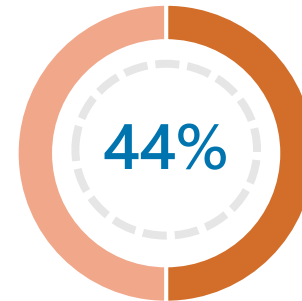

### IMPACT OF POTENTIAL CUTS TO FEDERAL FUNDING



Less funding to provide local health departments and community organizations for implementing prevention programs, increasing disease burden on all people



Increased rates of infectious disease due to limited capacity to protect people from infection and respond to communicable disease outbreaks



Cut programs that address children's health needs putting our nation's future at risk



Reduced ability to respond to environmental health threats putting communities at risk for health hazards



Reduce or eliminate the capacity to analyze public health data. The loss of this capacity limits the ability to make informed decisions about disease prevention and health planning.

## TOP 5 HEALTH AGENCY PRIORITIES

- 1 Address the opioid crisis and decrease overdose deaths
- 2 Reduce the use of tobacco, e-cigarettes/vaping devices, and marijuana in persons under 21 years of age
- 3 Implement plans to achieve End AIDS Washington goals
- 4 Reduce chronic diseases (diabetes, cancer, heart disease, stroke)
- 5 Secure sustainable funding for Foundational Public Health Services at the local and state levels

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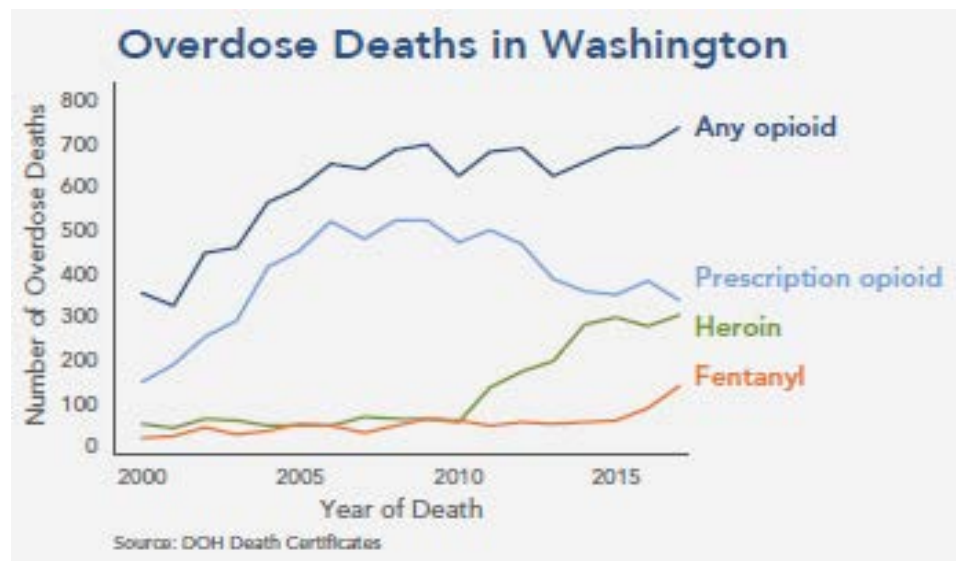
## CDC 2018 OPIOID OVERDOSE CRISIS FUNDING

Year 1 (FY18) \$6,424,375

This funding will support Washington State in working to prevent opioid-related overdoses, deaths, and other outcomes. It will advance the understanding of the epidemic and scale-up prevention and response activities, including improving the timeliness of data. Specifically:

- Educate providers statewide on opioid prescribing guidelines and rules
- Educate the public about the risks of prescription opioids through the CDC RX Awareness campaign.
- Increase number of providers trained each year to prescribe buprenorphine from 242 in 2016 to 679 in 2018
- Report quarterly fatal and nonfatal overdoses to partners by creating and disseminating public data dashboards
