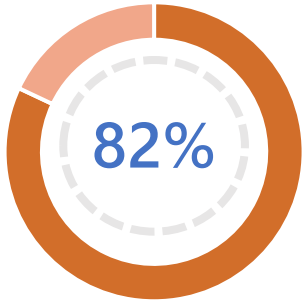
ABOUT STATE PUBLIC HEALTH

CDC OPIOID OVERDOSE CRISIS FUNDING

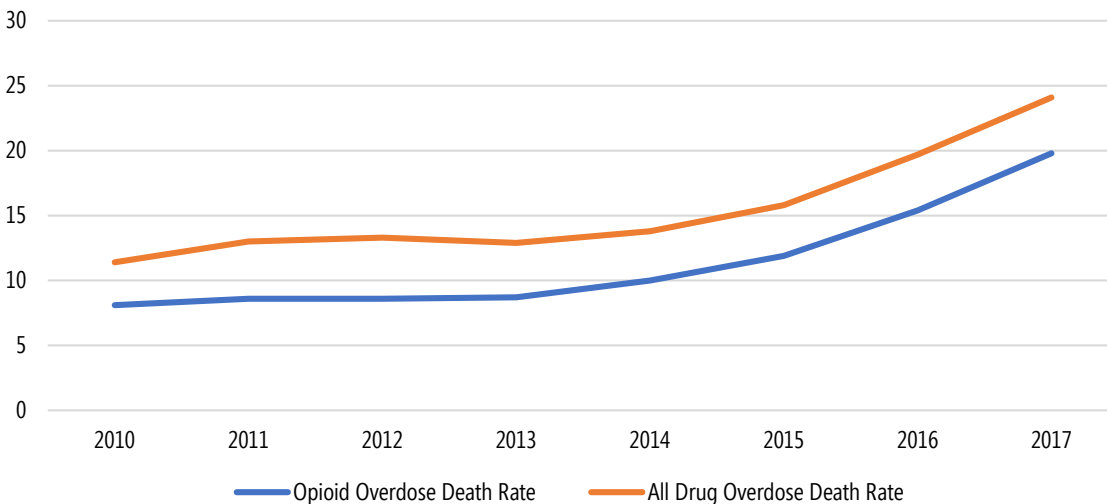
Year 1 (FY18) \$6,510,574

This funding will support North Carolina in working to prevent opioid-related overdoses, deaths, and other outcomes. It will advance the understanding of the epidemic and scale-up prevention and response activities, including improving the timeliness of data. Specifically:

- Strengthen statewide monitoring of the opioid epidemic
- Strengthen local responses to opioid epidemic including implementation of post-overdose response teams and syringe exchange programs
- Support training for first responders and medical residents, as well as public education campaigns
